The Arts and Humanities area of emphasis will help students prepare for transfer to a university in potential majors such as fine arts, English, linguistics, theatre, art history, philosophy, and related fields. Students are advised to consult with a counselor to develop an education plan that is appropriate to accomplish their academic goals.
