


The LTCC Campus Tour app provides prospective students and their families, community members, or anyone interested in Lake Tahoe Community College with an in-depth

CAMPUS CONSTRUCTION, SUMMER PROJECTS

Measure F bond funding continues to bring improvements to campus again this summer. Here's what's coming and how it may affect building and parking lot access this summer:

Main Parking Lot

The main parking lot on the south side of campus will be completed this summer. Work began in May and will be completed as quickly as possible. In addition to resurfacing the lot, existing walkways will be replaced to provide heat, and additional heated pathways will be constructed, similar to the path running through the entire lot for quicker and safer building access during winter. A plaza will also be constructed in front of the library, along with a new bike path that will eventually connect to South Lake Tahoe's integrated trail system. This project will impact parking access on campus! Please consider using public transportation or pedal power to visit campus during this work.

Lisa Maloff University Center

After graduation this summer, construction will begin for our new University Center. This highly anticipated project includes the placement of a new building located next to the existing theatre building. It will also include a significant amount of site work with a series of heated connecting sidewalks. This project will impact access in and out of the east side of the theatre building. Additionally, the current theatre parking lot will be unavailable during this project. There will still be access to the Child Development Center and to the parking area for the Garden buildings, Ledbetter Terrace, and Demonstration Garden.

Commons Renovation, Phase 2

This summer, before and after ISSI, will bring Phase 2 of our Commons project. This phase will focus on the remainder of work occurring on the first floor. Look for fresh color on the walls and new furniture. Despite the work going on, you will still be able to walk in and around the Commons.

Wireless Upgrades, Phase 2

We will be continuing the upgrades to our campus wireless system with the addition of more access points to improve your online experience.

PROYECTOS DE CONSTRUCCIÓN DENTRO DEL CAMPUS DURANTE EL VERANO:

La medida F de financiamiento con bonos continúa trayendo mejoras al campus nuevamente este verano. Esto es lo que está por llegar y cómo podría afectar el acceso a los edificios o al estacionamiento este verano.

Estacionamiento Principal

El estacionamiento principal localizado al sur del campus se completará este verano. El trabajo de construcción comenzó en mayo y terminará lo más rápido posible. Además de renovar el estacionamiento, los pasillos existentes serán reemplazados para proporcionar calefacción, y se construirán caminos con calefacción adicionales, los cuales serán similares al camino que recorre todo el estacionamiento, para contar con un acceso más rápido y más seguro al edificio durante el invierno. También se construirá una plaza al frente de la biblioteca, junto a un nuevo camino para bicicletas que con el tiempo conectará al sistema integrado de caminos de South Lake Tahoe. ¡Este proyecto tendrá un gran impacto en el acceso al estacionamiento en el campus! Por favor considera utilizar transporte público o la potencia del pedaleo para visitar el campus durante el proceso de construcción.

Centro Universitario Lisa Maloff

Después de las graduaciones este verano, comenzará la construcción de nuestro nuevo centro universitario. Este proyecto tan esperado incluye la creación de un nuevo edificio situado junto al teatro. También incluirá una serie de reformas en el área que incluyen aceras con calefacción conectadas entre sí. Este proyecto tendrá un gran impacto en la entrada y salida del lado este del edificio de artes. Adicionalmente, el estacionamiento actual del teatro no estará disponible durante este proyecto. Aún así habrá acceso al Centro de Desarrollo Infantil y al área los edificios del jardín, Ledbetter Terrace y Demonstration Garden.

Renovación del área central, Fase 2

Este verano, antes y después de ISSI, se realizará la fase 2 del proyecto en nuestra área central. Esta fase se enfocará en el trabajo restante que se realiza en el primer nivel. Observe el color nuevo en las paredes y los nuevos muebles. A pesar del trabajo que se estará realizando, tú todavía podrás entrar y caminar alrededor del área central.

Actualización de la conexión inalámbrica, Fase 2

Nosotros continuaremos las actualizaciones a nuestro sistema inalámbrico en el recinto, con la incorporación de más puntos de acceso para mejorar tu experiencia en línea.

Opportunities for CA Corrections Staff

Lake Tahoe Community College has partnered with the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) to provide an opportunity for CDCR staff to earn online certificate and associate degrees through the college, particularly in the fields of Criminal Justice and Administration of Justice (CRJ).

"With (CDCR) Secretary (Scott) Kernan's full support, one of the primary goals of the Department is to expand educational opportunities for CDCR staff," said Associate Director Stacy Lopez. "This educational opportunity opens the door for professional growth and increases potential for promotions."



CDCR employees have the opportunity for pay increases and promotional opportunities by taking college classes. LTCC designed a webpage (www.ltcc.edu/cdcr) for CDCR staff with information on the college, the CRJ program and courses, admissions information, and answers to frequently asked questions.

"We have a fully online program that will enable you to advance in your career with the CDCR through flexible scheduling, high quality education, and dedicated student support services. 

Fee Waiver Program

The State of California will waive the enrollment fee for all qualifying students who apply for the Board of Governors Fee Waiver* (BOGFW). This program provides three ways to help students pay the enrollment fee. Students eligible in one of the three following areas should visit the Financial Aid Office, Room A102, before registering for classes. Applications will normally be processed within 24 hours.

*Fee waiver does not cover the Student Representation fee of \$2. To opt out of the fee, please go to the One-Stop Center, A102.

BOGFW A

To be eligible you must:

- Be a California resident or eligible AB540 Student
- At the time of enrollment be a CalWORKs/TANF recipient or SSI/SSP or General Assistance/General Relief recipient
- Provide documentation, such as CalWORKs/TANF or SSI check. Further documentation may include: a copy of correspondence from the local office of Public Assistance which identifies the student or, if applicable, the family and indicates that a monthly grant is being awarded for the current or prior month. This can include a copy of an Adjustment-to-Benefits letter, Notice of Action, or Aid Verification Summary that shows current receipt of CalWORKs/TANF, SSI or General Assistance/General Relief and the amount of the grant.

BOGFW B

To be eligible you must:

- Be a California resident or eligible AB540 Student
- Meet Dependency Standards
- Meet 2015 Income Standards

BOGFW C

To be eligible you must:

- Be a California resident or eligible AB540 Student
- Provide your 2017-2018 Student Aid Report based on filing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) indicating financial need.

SPECIAL CLASSIFICATIONS:

You may also qualify for a fee waiver if you are determined to be a California resident or eligible AB540 student and you meet any of the following special classifications:

- You have certification from the CA Department of Veterans Affairs that you are eligible for a dependent's fee waiver.
- You have certification from the National Guard Adjutant General that you are eligible for a dependent's fee waiver.
- You are eligible as a recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor or as a child of a recipient, and can provide documentation of this from the Department of Veterans Affairs.
- You are eligible as a dependent of a victim of the 9/11/2001 terrorist attack and can provide documentation from the CA Victim Compensation and Government Claims Board.
- You are eligible as a dependent of a deceased law enforcement/fire suppression personnel killed in the line of duty, and can provide documentation from the public agency employer of record.

Making your educational dreams come true can be expensive. Enrollment fees, tuition, and the cost of books and supplies, added to daily expenses, can stretch a normal budget beyond its limits. Financial Aid is one way to expand those limits while making an investment in your future.

Lake Tahoe Community College participates in a number of federal and state programs designed to help you if you need financial assistance to further your education. If you are pursuing a certificate, A.A. Degree or transfer, and have financial need, you may be eligible for these programs, in addition to the fee waiver:

- **Grants** awards you do not have to repay (unless you drop all classes before completing 60% of the quarter)
- **Federal Work Study** part-time work paid monthly
- Scholarships awards usually based on academic achievement

Financial aid programs available through LTCC include:

- Federal Pell Grant
- Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG)
- Federal Work Study (FWS)
- Extended Opportunity Program & Services (EOPS) Book Voucher, State funded
- Scholarships, Locally funded

- Cal Grant, State funded
- Full-time Student Success Grant, State funded

To apply for any of these programs, please stop by the Financial Aid Office for forms and complete information and eligibility requirements. It costs nothing to apply; don't count yourself out of financial aid because you think you won't qualify. Processing may take from 6-8 weeks.

Exemption From Non-Resident Tuition

If you attended a California high school for a minimum of 3 years *and* graduated or attained the equivalent to a high school diploma (e.g., a GED or a high school proficiency exam) from a California high school, you may qualify for a non-resident tuition exemption. For more information, check with Enrollment Services.

Interstate Agreement

If you are a Nevada resident who lives in the 89402, 89451, 89450, 89413, 89448 or 89449 zip codes you may be eligible for an out-of-state tuition exemption through the Interstate Attendance Agreement between California and Nevada. Contact the One-Stop/Enrollment Services office for more information about reduced tuition for Nevada residents living in these zip codes.

Student Health & Representation Fees

All students enrolled for classes are required to pay a health fee of \$3 per quarter for emergency accident insurance. Students who rely solely on prayer for healing may be exempt from the health fee; see Enrollment Services for details. All enrolled students are also asked to pay \$2 per quarter for student representation. (Ed. Code 76060 and 76060.5) Students receiving Financial Aid may be exempt from health and representation fees; see the Financial Aid Office for details.

Open Enrollment and Non-Discrimination

It is the policy of the Lake Tahoe Community College District that, unless specifically exempted by statute, every course, course section, or class shall be fully open to enrollment and participation by any person who has been admitted to the College and who meets such prerequisites as may be established pursuant to regulations. It is also the policy of Lake Tahoe Community College not to discriminate on the basis of race, sex, physical handicap, religion, color, creed, national origin, language, or age in any of its educational and employment programs. Any questions regarding this policy should be referred to the Vice President, Academic Affairs.

Attention: Non-residents

Did you attend a California high school? Students who can answer yes to the questions below may qualify for lower fees through a non-resident tuition exemption:

- Did you attend one or more California high schools for at least 3 years?
- Did you graduate, get your GED, or the equivalent?

High School Students

High school students wishing to enroll in coursework at Lake Tahoe Community College are subject to special enrollment procedures. Information regarding those procedures is available in the high school counseling offices or in the college Enrollment Services department. Check the priority registration chart for high school student registration dates.

First Class Meeting Attendance Policy

Students enrolled in a course who fail to attend the first class meeting may be dropped from the course by the instructor. Students who will miss the first class meeting must inform the instructor of the absence *prior* to the first class meeting in order to be assured that they will remain enrolled in the class. This *does not* preclude the fact that students are ultimately responsible for dropping the class.

Refunds

REFUND POLICY

The policy below applies to fees charged for classes offered through the credit program including enrollment fees, non-resident tuition, material fees, and facility use fees. All refund requests are the responsibility of the student. Refunds may be subject to a waiting period of 15 business days if paid by check.

- Cancelled classes: All fees are fully refundable when the college cancels
 a class.
- **Dropping classes:** When a student chooses to drop a class before the start date, all fees are refundable with the exceptions listed below. In order to receive a refund on or after the start date, the drop must occur by the following deadlines:
 - Full-quarter (12-week) classes: Friday of the 2nd week of the quarter
 - Six-week session classes: Friday of the 1st week of the session
 - All other classes: prior to the 10% point of the class calculated in calendar days
 - Art material fees: if a student drops an art class after receiving materials, refunds will be pro-rated based on the amount of materials used
- Health and student representation fees: These quarter-based fees are refundable if all classes are dropped before the refund deadline for fullquarter classes. During summer, the fees are refundable through the refund deadline for the six-week session.
- Field trips and optional fees: A student may receive a field trip refund
 if withdrawal is made two weeks prior to the first class meeting. Beyond
 this, refunds may be obtained only if the student can be replaced by
 another student who completes registration and pays all fees. This
 cannot be guaranteed.
- Most service fees are non-refundable. These fees include amounts charged for challenge exams, transcripts, replacement diplomas, replacement certificates, and similar services.

EXCEPTIONS: Exceptions to the Lake Tahoe Community College refund policy may pertain to students requesting military withdrawal in accordance with California Military and Veterans Code, section 824.

Plan Ahead! Lake Tahoe Basin Fire Academy Mandatory Orientation

Attention Students interested in FIR 170A – Lake Tahoe Basin Fire Academy Mandatory Orientation

The extremely popular Lake Tahoe Basin Fire Academy will be held again during Fall 2017, Winter 2018, and Spring 2018 quarters. This academically and physically demanding training program is offered by Lake Tahoe Community College, in partnership with South Lake Tahoe Fire Rescue, Lake Valley Fire Protection District, Eastern Alpine Fire Rescue, and Tahoe Douglas Fire Protection District. A general medical clearance through the student's health care provider is required and will be explained in detail at the mandatory orientation meeting. Upon successful completion of the academy, students will meet the training requirements for California State Fire Marshal Firefighter I (which can be applied for after six months of career, or twelve months of volunteer firefighting experience).

Does the Academy have any prerequisites? Yes.

A minimum of 21 hours of Public Safety First Aid and CPR certification as documented in the California Health and Safety Code 17.97.182. LTCC courses that exceed this requirement are completion of HEA 106 (Emergency Medical Responder) or EMR card, OR Completion of HEA 140A (Emergency Medical Technician) with a "B" or better or equivalent EMT course certificate of completion. Prerequisites will be verified by the instructor on the first day of class.







The Transfer Center offers information for students planning to transfer to another college. College catalogs, applications for admission, articulation agreements, general education requirements, and transfer admission agreements are available.

Child Development Center ext. 288

The Child Development Center (CDC) is a fully licensed childcare facility located on the Lake Tahoe Community College campus. Licensed for 46 kids, ages 6 weeks through pre-kindergarten, the CDC is open year round serving the childcare needs of students, staff, faculty, and community members. Childcare is available in full or half day blocks, and meals are provided. Children must be enrolled for a minimum of two half-days per week. Although the CDC operates at full capacity, students have top priority and every attempt is made to accommodate their needs. Some subsidy money is also available through federal grant funds. Inquiry into space availability should be made at least one month prior to anticipated need.

Disability Resource Center ext. 249

The Disability Resource Center (DRC), located in Room A205, provides academic accommodations for students disabilities including learning, psychological, hearing, visual, and communication disabilities, as well as health disorders and mobility limitations. Learning disabilities assessment is offered using the California Community College LD Eligibility Model. Deaf or Hard of Hearing students may access a Video Phone located in the DRC.

Library & Study Areas ext. 232

The 19,000 square foot high-tech library has been designed to give students a spacious, comfortable, and stimulating environment. The new facility offers a variety of learning areas, including a half dozen group study rooms, an audiovisual viewing room, a fireside reading den, and study carrels overlooking the forest. Academic Policies

SATISFYING REQUIREMENTS

Each student must assume complete responsibility for compliance with the instructions and regulations set forth in this schedule for selecting the courses that will permit achievement of individual educational objectives, and for satisfying prerequisites for any course which they plan to take.

The College likewise assumes no responsibility for misinterpretation by students of policies and procedures as presented in this schedule. Counselors and faculty are available and willing to assist students in planning their programs.

Any questions or doubt concerning schedule material should be referred to the Office of the Vice President, Academic Affairs.

PREREQUISITES, COREQUISITES AND ADVISORIES

Some courses and educational programs have prerequisites, corequisites, or advisories considered necessary and appropriate to ensure that students are adequately prepared to succeed in the course or educational program.

What is a Prerequisite? A condition of enrollment that a student is required to meet in order to demonstrate current readiness in a course or educational program. Students are required to show proof of meeting the prerequisite in order to register for the course. Prerequisites completed at LTCC with a "C" or better will be automatically approved when students register for the course. Students who completed a prerequisite course at another college will need to provide proof to a LTCC counselor before they will be able to register.

What is a Corequisite? A condition of enrollment consisting of a course that students are required to complete simultaneously (or prior to) in order to enroll in another course. Students must register for the stated corequisite in order to register for the course.

What is an Advisory on Recommended Preparation? A condition of enrollment which students are advised, but not required, to meet before, or in conjunction with, enrollment in a course or educational program.

Are there other limitations on enrollment? Yes. Enrollment in certain courses or educational programs of study may require try-outs, auditions, or may be limited by health and safety considerations, and space limitations or legal requirements imposed by statutes, regulations or contracts. All such limitations are in conformity with the provisions of Title 5, Section 58106, California Community College Board of Governors.

What if I don't have the necessary prerequisites or corequisites? Students will not be permitted to enroll in a class for which they cannot demonstrate they have met the prerequisite, or are enrolled in the corequisite. If it is determined after a course begins that a student has not met the prerequisite, he/she will be dropped from the course.

Grounds for appeal

- The student has the knowledge or ability to succeed in the course or program despite not meeting the prerequisite or corequisite.
- The student possesses the skills/knowledge necessary to protect the health or safety of him/herself and others despite not meeting the stated health and safety prerequisite.
- The prerequisite or corequisite course is either unlawfully discriminatory or is being applied in an unlawfully discriminatory manner.
- The student will be subject to undue delay in attaining the goal of his or her educational plan because the prerequisite or corequisite has not been made reasonably available.
- The prerequisite or corequisite has not been established in accordance with the District's process for establishing prerequisites or corequisites.
- The prerequisite or corequisite is in violation of Title 5.

Prerequisite Appeal Procedure

A student may appeal a prerequisite or corequisite by filing a Prerequisite or Corequisite Appeal Petition. This form can be obtained from Enrollment Services.

- The complete appeal petition must be filed with Enrollment Services prior to
- The appeal petition will be processed within five working days of its receipt and the student notified accordingly.
- If the appeal is upheld, the student will remain in the course.
- In the event the petition is denied the student will be disenrolled; however, the student may appeal the decision in writing directly to the Division Dean or Vice-President, Academic Affairs.
- Student will be notified of the appeal decision within five working days.

Legal Information

Fees Subject to Change

All fees are subject to change without notice pending Board or State legislative action. Students are responsible for any additional fees mandated by the State Legislature.

Failure to Pay a Financial Obligation

Grades, transcripts, diplomas, and registration privileges, or any combination thereof, shall be withheld from any student who has been provided with written notice that he/she has failed to pay a proper financial obligation due to the LTCC District. Items withheld shall be released when the student meets financial obligations (Title 5 section 59410).

Open Enrollment

It is the policy of the Lake Tahoe Community College District that, unless specifically exempted by statute, every course, course section or class, the enrollment of which is to be reported for state aid, whenever offered and maintained by the District, shall be fully open to enrollment and participation by any person who has been admitted to the College, and who meets such prerequisites as may be established pursuant to regulations contained in Article 2.5 (commencing with Section 55200) of Subchapter 1 of Chapter 1 of Division 6 of Title 5.




