



Circle K Club supports the Kiwanis Club of Lake Tahoe, and this year has volunteered over 250 hours supporting local youth! Their most recent collaboration includes the Coats for Kids project, organizing over 350 coats for local kids in the Lake Tahoe Unified School District as well as LTCC and the Giving Tree to support gifts for special needs children this last Christmas.

For the 22nd year, the Math Club collaborates with homeschooled students and the Lake Tahoe Unified School District, volunteering to provide math tutoring for all ages. # **Coyote Soccer - 2017 Season Wrap-Up**

Congratulations to our Coyote men's and women's soccer teams on yet another electrifying season! At one point this fall, both teams were in the top 20 in United Soccer Coaches Junior College Division III national rankings – the men were ranked as high as #8, and the women #10.



Under the leadership of Head Coach Ieremy Evans and Assistant Coach Nicole Vandehurst, our women's team finished the regular season ranked #10 in the country and went on to win the Golden Valley Conference (GVC) with a 12-0 record, breaking conference records in the process. Coach Evans, whose efforts and commitment to his players resulted in a history-making season, earned the award for Coach of the Year in the GVC. The team gave up only one goal in conference play and scored 82! It was a joy to watch the women play such beautiful soccer. They ultimately lost in the second round of the regional playoffs to Santa Rosa Junior College in an intense game that could have gone either way. It was a hard loss, but the women Coyotes have a lot to feel proud about this season.

Our men's team ended the season tied with Feather River for second place in the GVC but did not advance to the playoffs due to Feather River's higher power ranking. The squad, led by Head Coach Nick Arbelaez and Assistant Coach Steve Maltase, finished with an overall record of 12-3-4 – yet another winning season for the men! In any other year, that outcome would have been enough for a playoff berth, but revitalized Lassen and Feather River teams proved a tough obstacle to overcome.

There were several student-athletes from both teams who earned academic and all-conference awards during the 2017 season. For the women, Rebecca Niblett and Kenya Brazzell were honored as Scholar-Athletes (sophomores with minimum 3.3 GPA). Lewis Gillings and Josh Sapsed received that award on the men's side. First year student Madison Boyd earned the prestigious Most Valuable Player award for her dominance in the backfield. Sophomores Caitlyn Bidart and Dalton Rice both received Defensive Player of the Year awards. Melanie Ara, Claudia Janese, Sean Keith, Rebecca Niblett, and Manuel Sarabia were



all recognized as First Team All-Conference for their value on the field. Jazmine Corvalan, Jorge Medina, Graciela Palencia, Josh Sapsed, and Zareli Villa were chosen as Second Team All-Conference. At the national level, sophomore Rebecca Niblett was named to the 2017 United Soccer Coaches Junior College Women's Scholar All-America Team for Second Team! She is LTCC's first woman to receive this honor.

Most of our sophomore student-athletes will be transferring to four-year colleges and universities this year to go to the next level of education and athletic competition. LTCC wishes our sophomores all the best on their endeavors! Meanwhile, we're excited to see the first year students return next season to represent LTCC on the pitch.

# **Concluye la temporada de fútbol Coyotes del 2017**

Felicidades a nuestros equipos Coyotes femeninos y masculinos por darnos otra electrizante temporada. En un momento este otoño, los dos equipos de fútbol estaban en el top 20 de la Clasificación Nacional del United Soccer Coaches Junior Division III los hombres estaban clasificados como #8 y, las mujeres #10.

Bajo el liderazgo del entrenador en jefe Jeremy Evans y entrenador asistente Nicole Vandehurst, nuestro equipo femenino terminó la temporada regular clasificado #10 en el país y ganando la Conferencia Golden Valley (GVC) con un récord de 12-0, rompiendo los récords de la conferencia. El entrenador Evans, cuyos esfuerzos y compromisos a sus jugadores resultaron en una temporada histórica, ganó el premio de Coach of the Year (entrenador del año) en la GVC. El equipo sólo cedió un gol en el juego de conferencia, y ¡anotaron 82! Fue un gusto ver al equipo femenino jugar un fútbol tan hermoso. Al final le perdieron a Santa Rosa junior College en la segunda ronda de los playoffs regionales en un juego intenso que pudo haber sido para cualquiera de los dos. Fue duro perder, pero las Coyotes femeninas tienen mucho de que estar orgullosas esta temporada.

Nuestro equipo de hombres terminó la temporada empatados en segundo lugar con Feather River en el GVC pero no avanzaron a los playoffs porque Feather River tenía una clasificación de mayor poder. El escuadrón, dirigido por el entrenador Nick Arbelaez y el entrenador asistente Steve Maltase, terminó con un registro general de 12-3-4 — aún otra temporada ganadora para los hombres. En cualquier otro año, ese resultado hubiera sido suficiente para un puesto de desempate, pero los equipos revitalizados de Lassen y Feather River resultaron ser obstáculos difíciles de superar.









Varios estudiantes atletas, de los dos equipos, ganaron premios académicos y de all-conference durante la temporada del 2017. De las mujeres, Rebecca Niblett y Kenya Brazzel fueron honradas como Scholar Athlete, atletas eruditas, (de segundo año con un promedio mínimo de 3.3). Lewis Gillings y Josh Sapsed recibieron ese premio del lado de los hombres. La estudiante de primer año, Madison Boyd, ganó el prestigioso premio de Most Valuable Player (jugadora más valiosa) por su dominio en el backfield (campo trasero). Las sophomores (de segundo año) Caitlyn Bidart y Dalton Rice recibieron el premio Defensive Player of the Year. Melanie Ara, Claudia Janese, Sean Keith, Rebecca Niblett y Manuel Sarabia fueron reconocidos como First Team All-Conference por su valor en el campo. Jazmine Corvalan, Jorge Medina, Graciela Palencia, Josh Sapsed y Zareli Villa fueron elegidos como Second Team All-Conference. Al nivel nacional, Rebecca Niblett fue seleccionada para el 2017 United Soccer Coaches Junior College Women's Scholar All-American Team for Second Team! Ella es la primera mujer de LTCC en recibir este honor.

La mayoría de nuestros estudiantes – atletas de segundo año transferirán a universidades de cuatro años este año para ir al siguiente nivel de educación y competencia atlética. ¡LTCC les desea a nuestros estudiantes de segundo año lo mejor en sus esfuerzos! Mientras tanto, estamos emocionados esperando a nuestros estudiantes de primer año que regresarán la próxima temporada para representar a LTCC en el campo.

During flu season (September through March) students must provide documentation of annual flu vaccination.

NOTE: Attendance is mandatory at the first class and all class meetings in order to receive certification. There is an \$100 county and state certification fee, a Department of Justice/FBI livescan fee of \$100, and a National Registry of EMT certification fee of \$80. All fees are paid to external agencies.







# INTERNSHIP

### **INTERNSHIP - GENERAL WORK EXPERIENCE**

Internship - Occupational Work Experience is a student-earned worksite placement for on-the-job experience in positions directly related to their academic and career goals. An internship may be exploratory. Internship students must complete an application and be interviewed/selected by the instructor prior to the orientation. Student interns must have a good academic record and should have completed some of the courses required in their major. Here are the steps to get started: First, complete an application available online at ltcc.edu or at the Work Experience / Internship Office. Next, make an appointment to interview with instructor by calling ext. 294 or emailing workexp@ltcc.edu. Attend mandatory orientation meeting (only after interviews and a confirmed internship). Each 50 hours of paid work equals one unit. Each 40 hours of non-paid work equals one unit.

COREQUISITES: Students must be available to volunteer 4 to 24 hours per week (if paid, hours per week increase as outlined in the work experience program) for an approved business and must have an application on file each quarter enrolled.

Applications are available online at www.ltcc.edu under academics. Internships can be on a paid or volunteer basis and students are encouraged to apply at least a month before the quarter begins.

# Fee Waiver Program



The State of California will waive the enrollment fee for all qualifying students who apply for the Board of Governors Fee Waiver<sup>\*</sup> (BOGFW). This program provides three ways to help students pay the enrollment fee. Students eligible in one of the three following areas should visit the Financial Aid Office, Room A102, before registering for classes. Applications will normally be processed within 24 hours. *\*Fee waiver does not cover the Student Representation fee of \$2. To opt out of the fee, please go to the One-Stop Center, A102.* 

#### BOGFW A

To be eligible you must:

- Be a California resident or eligible AB540 Student
- At the time of enrollment be a CalWORKs/TANF recipient or SSI/SSP or General Assistance/General Relief recipient
- Provide documentation, such as CalWORKs/TANF or SSI check. Further documentation may include: a copy of correspondence from the local office of Public Assistance which identifies the student or, if applicable, the family and indicates that a monthly grant is being awarded for the current or prior month. This can include a copy of an Adjustment-to-Benefits letter, Notice of Action, or Aid Verification Summary that shows current receipt of CalWORKs/TANF, SSI or General Assistance/General Relief and the amount of the grant.

#### BOGFW B

To be eligible you must:

- Be a California resident or eligible AB540 Student
- Meet Dependency Standards
- Meet 2015 Income Standards

#### BOGFW C

To be eligible you must:

- Be a California resident or eligible AB540 Student
- Provide your 2017-2018 Student Aid Report based on filing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) indicating financial need.

#### SPECIAL CLASSIFICATIONS:

You may also qualify for a fee waiver if you are determined to be a California resident or eligible AB540 student and you meet any of the following special classifications:

- You have certification from the CA Department of Veterans Affairs that you are eligible for a dependent's fee waiver.
- You have certification from the National Guard Adjutant General that you are eligible for a dependent's fee waiver.
- You are eligible as a recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor or as a child of a recipient, and can provide documentation of this from the Department of Veterans Affairs.
- You are eligible as a dependent of a victim of the 9/11/2001 terrorist attack and can provide documentation from the CA Victim Compensation and Government Claims Board.
- You are eligible as a dependent of a deceased law enforcement/fire suppression personnel killed in the line of duty, and can provide documentation from the public agency employer of record.

Making your educational dreams come true can be expensive. Enrollment fees, tuition, and the cost of books and supplies, added to daily expenses, can stretch a normal budget beyond its limits. Financial Aid is one way to expand those limits while making an investment in your future.

Lake Tahoe Community College participates in a number of federal and state programs designed to help you if you need financial assistance to further your education. If you are pursuing a certificate, A.A. Degree or transfer, and have financial need, you may be eligible for these programs, in addition to the fee waiver:

- **Grants** awards you do not have to repay (unless you drop all classes before completing 60% of the quarter)
- Federal Work Study part-time work paid monthly
- Scholarships awards usually based on academic achievement

Financial aid programs available through LTCC include:

- Federal Pell Grant
- Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG)
- Federal Work Study (FWS)
- Extended Opportunity Program & Services (EOPS) Book Voucher, State funded
- Scholarships, Locally funded
- Board of Governors Fee Waiver, State funded
- Cal Grant, State funded
- Full-time Student Success Grant, State funded

To apply for any of these programs, please stop by the Financial Aid Office for forms and complete information and eligibility requirements. It costs nothing to apply; don't count yourself out of financial aid because you think you won't qualify. Processing may take from 6-8 weeks.

#### **Exemption From Non-Resident Tuition**

If you attended a California high school for a minimum of 3 years *and* graduated or attained the equivalent to a high school diploma (e.g., a GED or a high school proficiency exam) from a California high school, you may qualify for a non-resident tuition exemption. For more information, check with Enrollment Services.

#### Interstate Agreement

If you are a Nevada resident who lives in the 89402, 89451, 89450, 89413, 89448 or 89449 zip codes you may be eligible for an out-of-state tuition exemption through the Interstate Attendance Agreement between California and Nevada. Contact the One-Stop/Enrollment Services office for more information about reduced tuition for Nevada residents living in these zip codes.

#### Student Health & Representation Fees

All students enrolled for classes are required to pay a health fee of \$3 per quarter for emergency accident insurance. Students who rely solely on prayer for healing may be exempt from the health fee; see Enrollment Services for details. All enrolled students are also asked to pay \$2 per quarter for student representation. (Ed. Code 76060 and 76060.5) Students receiving Financial Aid may be exempt from health and representation fees; see the Financial Aid Office for details.

#### **Open Enrollment and Non-Discrimination**

It is the policy of the Lake Tahoe Community College District that, unless specifically exempted by statute, every course, course section, or class shall be fully open to enrollment and participation by any person who has been admitted to the College and who meets such prerequisites as may be established pursuant to regulations. It is also the policy of Lake Tahoe Community College not to discriminate on the basis of race, sex, physical handicap, religion, color, creed, national origin, language, or age in any of its educational and employment programs. Any questions regarding this policy should be referred to the Vice President, Academic Affairs.

# Attention: Non-residents

Did you attend a California high school? Students who can answer yes to the questions below may qualify for lower fees through a non-resident tuition exemption:

- Did you attend one or more California high schools for at least 3 years?
- Did you graduate, or earn your High School Equivalency?

#### High School Students

High school students wishing to enroll in coursework at Lake Tahoe Community College are subject to special enrollment procedures. Information regarding those procedures is available in the high school counseling offices or in the college Enrollment Services department. Check the priority registration chart for high school student registration dates.

#### First Class Meeting Attendance Policy

Students enrolled in a course who fail to attend the first class meeting may be dropped from the course by the instructor. Students who will miss the first class meeting must inform the instructor of the absence *prior* to the first class meeting in order to be assured that they will remain enrolled in the class. This *does not* preclude the fact that students are ultimately responsible for dropping the class.

# Refunds

# REFUND POLICY

The policy below applies to fees charged for classes offered through the credit program including enrollment fees, non-resident tuition, material fees, and facility use fees. All refund requests are the responsibility of the student. Refunds may be subject to a waiting period of 15 business days if paid by check.

- **Cancelled classes:** All fees are fully refundable when the college cancels a class.
- **Dropping classes:** When a student chooses to drop a class before the start date, all fees are refundable with the exceptions listed below. In order to receive a refund on or after the start date, the drop must occur by the following deadlines:
  - Full-quarter (12-week) classes: Friday of the 2nd week of the quarter
  - Six-week session classes: Friday of the 1st week of the session
  - All other classes: prior to the 10% point of the class calculated in calendar days
  - Art material fees: if a student drops an art class after receiving materials, refunds will be pro-rated based on the amount of materials used
- Health and student representation fees: These quarter-based fees are refundable if all classes are dropped before the refund deadline for full-quarter classes. During summer, the fees are refundable through the refund deadline for the six-week session.
- Field trips and optional fees: A student may receive a field trip refund if withdrawal is made two weeks prior to the first class meeting. Beyond this, refunds may be obtained only if the student can be replaced by another student who completes registration and pays all fees. This cannot be guaranteed.
- Most service fees are non-refundable. These fees include amounts charged for challenge exams, transcripts, replacement diplomas, replacement certificates, and similar services.

EXCEPTIONS: Exceptions to the Lake Tahoe Community College refund policy may pertain to students requesting military withdrawal in accordance with California Military and Veterans Code, section 824.

# Transfer Center ext. 211

The Transfer Center offers information for students planning to transfer to another college. College catalogs, applications for admission, articulation agreements, general education requirements, and transfer admission agreements are available.

# Child Development Center ext. 288

The Child Development Center (CDC) is a fully licensed childcare facility located on the Lake Tahoe Community College campus. Licensed for 46 kids, ages 6 weeks through pre-kindergarten, the CDC is open year round serving the childcare needs of students, staff, faculty, and community members. Childcare is available in full or half day blocks, and meals are provided. Children must be enrolled for a minimum of two half-days per week. Although the CDC operates at full capacity, students have top priority and every attempt is made to accommodate their needs. Some subsidy money is also available through federal grant funds. Inquiry into space availability should be made at least one month prior to anticipated need.

# **Disability Resource Center** ext. 249

The Disability Resource Center (DRC), located in Room A205, provides academic accommodations for students disabilities including learning, psychological, hearing, visual, and communication disabilities, as well as health disorders and mobility limitations. Learning disabilities assessment is offered using the California Community College LD Eligibility Model. Deaf or Hard of Hearing students may access a Video Phone located in the DRC.

# Library & Learning Services ext. 232

At the Library & Learning Services, students can get help with tutoring, writing, and research all in one convenient location. This beautiful 27,000 square foot facility originally opened in September 2006 and is now home to the Math Success Center, Writing Center, and proctoring services. The library collection supports the college curriculum with over 40,000 volumes; subscriptions to 10,000 periodicals via online databases; a cozy fireside collection of print magazines and newspapers; a DVD/video and CD collection; and a Tahoe rare book collection. The library's online resources, such as its catalog and online databases, can be accessed 24 hours a day via its website.

We provide individualized instruction in a variety of formats to meet students' research and learning needs. Math tutors are available all library hours to help with everything from Algebra to Statistics and Calculus. Make an appointment with a Writing tutor to get focused feedback on your draft papers and assignments. Subject-specific tutors such as Sign Language, Biology, and Spanish are scheduled throughout the week. Need help with a research paper? Just ask! A librarian will work one-on-one with you to develop your information literacy and research skills.



You must petition for the exam and pay the non-refundable challenge exam fee in the ONE-STOP/Enrollment Services. The last day to petition for a Spring challenge exam is Friday, April 6. Credit by examination will be held on Friday, April 13, 2018 at 2:00-4:30pm, in Room A250. If enrolled in the class, it is the students' responsibility to attend classes for which they are enrolled until the grade is posted and to request their grade for the challenge exam.

# Work Experience Mandatory Orientations



# Academic Policies SATISFYING REQUIREMENTS

Each student must assume complete responsibility for compliance with the instructions and regulations set forth in this schedule for selecting the courses that will permit achievement of individual educational objectives, and for satisfying prerequisites for any course which they plan to take.

The College likewise assumes no responsibility for misinterpretation by students of policies and procedures as presented in this schedule. Counselors and faculty are available and willing to assist students in planning their programs.

Any questions or doubt concerning schedule material should be referred to the Office of the Vice President, Academic Affairs.

#### PREREQUISITES, COREQUISITES AND ADVISORIES

Some courses and educational programs have prerequisites, corequisites, or advisories considered necessary and appropriate to ensure that students are adequately prepared to succeed in the course or educational program.

What is a Prerequisite? A condition of enrollment that a student is required to meet in order to demonstrate current readiness in a course or educational program. Students are required to show proof of meeting the prerequisite in order to register for the course. Prerequisites completed at LTCC with a "C" or better will be automatically approved when students register for the course. Students who completed a prerequisite course at another college will need to provide proof to a LTCC counselor before they will be able to register.

What is a Corequisite? A condition of enrollment consisting of a course that students are required to complete simultaneously (or prior to) in order to enroll in another course. Students must register for the stated corequisite in order to register for the course.

What is an Advisory on Recommended Preparation? A condition of enrollment which students are advised, *but not required*, to meet before, or in conjunction with, enrollment in a course or educational program.

Are there other limitations on enrollment? Yes. Enrollment in certain courses or educational programs of study may require try-outs, auditions, or may be limited by health and safety considerations, and space limitations or legal requirements imposed by statutes, regulations or contracts. All such limitations are in conformity with the provisions of Title 5, Section 58106, California Community College Board of Governors.

What if I don't have the necessary prerequisites or corequisites? Students will not be permitted to enroll in a class for which they cannot demonstrate they have met the prerequisite, or are enrolled in the corequisite. If it is determined after a course begins that a student has not met the prerequisite, he/she will be dropped from the course.

#### Grounds for appeal

- The student has the knowledge or ability to succeed in the course or program despite not meeting the prerequisite or corequisite.
- The student possesses the skills/knowledge necessary to protect the health or safety of him/herself and others despite not meeting the stated health and safety prerequisite.
- The prerequisite or corequisite course is either unlawfully discriminatory or is being applied in an unlawfully discriminatory manner.
- The student will be subject to undue delay in attaining the goal of his or her educational plan because the prerequisite or corequisite has not been made reasonably available.
- The prerequisite or corequisite has not been established in accordance with the District's process for establishing prerequisites or corequisites.
- The prerequisite or corequisite is in violation of Title 5.

#### Prerequisite Appeal Procedure

A student may appeal a prerequisite or corequisite by filing a Prerequisite or Corequisite Appeal Petition. This form can be obtained from Enrollment Services.

- The complete appeal petition must be filed with Enrollment Services prior to registration.
- The appeal petition will be processed within five working days of its receipt and the student notified accordingly.
- 3. If the appeal is upheld, the student will remain in the course.
- 4. In the event the petition is denied the student will be disenrolled; however, the student may appeal the decision in writing directly to the Division Dean or Vice-President, Academic Affairs.
- 5. Student will be notified of the appeal decision within five working days.

# Legal Information

#### Fees Subject to Change

All fees are subject to change without notice pending Board or State legislative action. Students are responsible for any additional fees mandated by the State Legislature.

#### Failure to Pay a Financial Obligation

Grades, transcripts, diplomas, and registration privileges, or any combination thereof, shall be withheld from any student who has been provided with written notice that he/she has failed to pay a proper financial obligation due to the LTCC District. Items withheld shall be released when the student meets financial obligations (Title 5 section 59410).

#### **Open Enrollment**

It is the policy of the Lake Tahoe Community College District that, unless specifically exempted by statute, every course, course section or class, the enrollment of which is to be reported for state aid, whenever offered and maintained by the District, shall be fully open to enrollment and participation by any person who has been admitted to the College, and who meets such prerequisites as may be established pursuant to regulations contained in Article 2.5 (commencing with Section 55200) of Subchapter 1 of Chapter 1 of Division 6 of Title 5.

#### Schedule Accuracy

This schedule lists the classes that the college plans to offer this quarter and describes enrollment and registration guidelines. All courses and special events are subject to funding, scheduling, and instructor availability, and are subject to change at any time.


