Regarding the number of certificates awarded, the College has 23 "Employable Skills Certificates" that it awards locally. With the increased ability to record at least four of these certificates with the Chancellor's Office, the College would like to note here the total number of certificates, including "Employable Skills," of which there were 126 in 2016-17, would be 159. There were 33 regularly transcripted certificates awarded which is the number noted in response to question 14.

The College is excited to see relatively significant growth in the number of CTE areas in which there were 10 or more completes this year. Additionally, it is notable that in all but one of those areas, there was growth in the job placement percentages. LTCC has been focusing more attention on outreach to students in CTE areas to support student success and completion. Additionally, good work is being done with our partners in the North/Far North and locally with our Adult Education Consortium (ADVANCE, the Lake Tahoe Adult Education Consortium) to meet industry needs locally and regionally in career sectors.

The College continues to make significant and notable improvements in the number of courses with ongoing assessment. The last several years of annual report data on SLOs have grown from 22.5% in 2015 (a total of 292 courses with ongoing assessment) to 40.95% in a follow-up report to the ACCJC in October of 2015, to 61.11% in the 2016 Annual Report (or 484 courses) to this year's report, which demonstrates 77.14% (or 577 courses) with ongoing assessment. The denominator (748 active courses) is a reflection of all LTCC's active courses that were run successfully during the assessment cycle. The faculty assess courses that fall outside of that sequence when they are next offered, in compliance with the College's assessment process. There are approximately 115 additional courses in the College's system that were not offered successfully within the accreditation cycle. While we did not include them in the numbers above, we do consider them in compliance with our process. If those numbers were included in both the numerator and denominator, the percentage of courses with ongoing assessment would be, in fact, 80.19%, or 692 courses). However, the College feels that the more accurate assessment numbers should be based on the courses offered successfully and assessed appropriately within the 3-year cycle it has established.

All of that being said, we are excited about the progress we have been able to make regarding SLO assessments, both on the level of compliance and in terms of the institutional dialogue that has been generated by these efforts. The faculty, staff, and administrators are have more robust discussions across constituency groups about student learning and the outcomes that the College sees as essential for students' success moving forward, at the course level and beyond. The institution is engaging fully in discussions and planning around Guided Pathways and Integrated Planning and, thus, has also been strategizing more fully about how to assess directly Program Level SLOs and Institutional Level SLOs. We look forward to full implementation of eLumen beginning this winter and spring for both SLO assessment, tracking, curriculum management, and program planning and review. We are confident that this system will help us move the dial even further on our SLO assessment data collection and analysis.
